



What, Where and Who Can Ride?



A quick guide to who, where and how to avoid an accident, citation or impound for you and your vehicle

(*this is for informal reference only, this is not legal advice. If you have any questions, confirm with DMV or North Salt Lake Police)

	Pedestrian or wheelchair	Non-Motorized person traveling on foot or in a wheelchair.	N/A	Roads - yielding to motor vehicles except at crosswalks, sidewalks, trails, parks, buildings, etc. (basically any public area)	Areas that are closed to pedestrian traffic such as freeways, railway corridors, etc.
	Bicycle [tricycle and pedal car(ts)]	Non-Motorized. Generally two, three or four-wheeled vehicle powered only by pedals and cranks. Must have a white light facing forward and a rear taillight or reflector during nighttime.	Speed limit maximum or reasonably safe speed based on conditions.	Roadways to the rightmost area of the lane, bike lanes, trails and sidewalks yielding to pedestrians.	Areas that are closed to non-motorized traffic such as freeway, railway corridors, trails prohibiting bicycles.
	Electric Bicycles or Tricycles SEE BELOW FOR DIFFERENT TYPES AND CLASSES.	A two or three wheeled vehicle with an electric motor 750 Watts or less. It must have operable pedals and be fully operational without motor assistance. Must have a white light facing forward and a rear taillight or reflector during nighttime.	Bicycles and e-bikes operated on a roadway are considered vehicles as it relates to traffic laws. Must obey stop, yield, and speed direction.	In most cases it may be operated how and where bicycles are allowed with below listed restrictions	Where Bicycles, or types of e-bikes are prohibited by signs. Restricted areas such as freeways, rail corridors, etc.
	Class 1 E-Bike	NO THROTTLE, pedal assist only. Pedal assist only up to 20 mph.	Speed limit maximum or reasonably safe speed based on conditions.	Unless otherwise prohibited by signs, same as a non-motorized bicycle. Under age 14 must be directly supervised by parent or guardian.	No person under 8 years old. Same restrictions as above.
	Class 2 E-Bike	Has a motor that can be powered exclusively by a throttle up to 20 mph	Speed limit maximum or reasonably safe speed based on conditions.	Unless otherwise prohibited by signs, same as a non-motorized bicycle. Under age 14 must be directly supervised by parent or guardian.	No person under 8 years old. Same restrictions as above. Where prohibited by signage or other proper notice. Some trails may have signs restricting Class 2 and Class 3 E-Bikes.
	Class 3 E-Bike	Has a motor and throttle that can provide assistance up to 28 MPH. MUST HAVE A SPEEDOMETER.	Speed limit maximum or reasonably safe speed based on conditions.	Unless otherwise prohibited by signs, same as a non-motorized bicycle. Must be 16 or older. Some trails may have signs restricting Class 1 and Class 3 E-Bikes.	No person under 16 years old. Same restrictions as above. Where prohibited by signage or other proper notice.
	Motor Assisted Scooter	Has a platform for standing or sitting, handlebars, brakes, and electric motor not larger than 2000 Watts. Must have a white light facing forward and a rear taillight or reflector during nighttime.	20 MPH	Wherever a bicycle may be operated, but must stay to the far right of the roadway. May not use a full lane.	No person under 8 years old may operate.
	Electric Personal Mobility Device	A self balancing device like a Segway®, hoverboard, or similar standing device. (Motor may NOT exceed 1 HP or 750 Watts.)	12.5 MPH	In most places where bikes are allowed, but must keep to the far right of the roadway. May not use a full lane.	Any roadway with four (4) or more lanes, or speed limit greater than 35 MPH. Anyone 15 or under is required to be under the direct supervision of a parent or guardian.
	Golf Cart	A vehicle that: *Is designed for transportation of players on a golf course. *At least three (3) tires in contact with the ground. *Weighs less than 1800 lbs. *Is designed to carry six or less passengers, including the driver.	Safe and reasonable for use and conditions on Eaglewood Golf Course.	Eaglewood Golf Course and direct street crossings at 800 Foxhill Rd., 130 Eaglewood Dr., 1120 Fairway Pl., and 840 Eaglewood Loop ONLY. (Private property okay).	No Public streets, trails, sidewalks, parks, or parking lots. Driving a golf cart to and from Eaglewood Golf Course on public right of way is PROHIBITED. Privately owned golf carts must be transported on a street legal trailer or other vehicle.

THE FOLLOWING VEHICLESS ARE DESIGNATED AS MOTOR VEHICLES AND MUST BE REGISTERED AND INSURED FOR ON-ROAD USE ON PUBLIC ROADWAYS. Using public roadways require the operator to have a valid driver license and appropriate endorsements for the type of vehicle driven.

North Salt Lake does **NOT** have any trails designated for the use of OHV's.

Unregistered vehicles, or vehicles driven on public streets without valid registration, are subject to impound. Operators without proper license (Utah Class D) with proper endorsement are subject to a citation.

	Moped	A motor driven cycle, generally two wheels with a motor of no more than 2 HP or 50 cc's. May have crankshaft and pedals that can power the vehicle with human power.	30 MPH maximum.	Public roadways with a speed of less than 35 MPH. Public parking lots. A valid driver license with a motorcycle endorsement is required. Under 21 years old must wear a helmet.	No trails, sidewalks, golf course, or railway corridors. No unlicensed drivers without appropriate motorcycle endorsement.
	Motor Driven Cycles	A motorcycle or motorized tricycle with a motor up to 150 cc's, 5 HP, or a electric bike with an motor that exceeds 750 watts.	Speed limit maximum or reasonably safe speed for conditions.	Public roadway if properly registered and insured. Driver must have a valid driver license with appropriate motorcycle endorsement. Riders under 21 must wear a DOT approved helmet.	Sidewalks, trails, golf course, railway corridors or any other non-roadway right of way.
	Motorcycles	A motor vehicle with a seat or a saddle and no more than three wheels. Has a motor greater than 150 cc's or 5 HP.	Speed limit maximum or reasonably safe speed for conditions.	Any public roadway. Operators must have a valid driver license with an appropriate motorcycle endorsement. Riders under 21 must wear a DOT approved helmet.	Sidewalks, trails, railway corridors.
	ATV's	An all-terrain vehicle that is a Type I or Utility Type Vehicle (UTV) may be inspected and registered as a Street-legal ATV. These types are defined as: "All-Terrain Type I Vehicle" means any motor vehicle 52 inches or less in width, having an unladen dry weight of 1,500 pounds or less, traveling on three or more low pressure tires, having a seat designed to be straddled by the operator, and designed for or capable of travel over unimproved terrain.	Posted speed limit or 45 MPH, whichever is less.	On any highway with one lane in each direction. (A highway that has an occasional passing lane is still considered as having one lane in each direction.) Helmet is required for all riders and operators under the age of 18.	Trails, sidewalks, parks (other than parking lot), freeway, highways with more than one lane each direction. Any other area lawfully posted restricting such traffic.
	UTV's	"Utility Type Vehicle" means any recreational vehicle designed for and capable of travel over unimproved terrain; traveling on four or more tires, having a width of 30 to 70 inches, having an unladen dry weight of 2,200 pounds or less, having a seat height of 25 to 40 inches when measured at the forward edge of the seat bottom, and having side by side seating with a steering wheel for control. "Utility Type Vehicle" does not include an All-terrain Type I Vehicle, a motorcycle or a snowmobile.	Posted speed limit or 45 MPH, whichever is less.	On any highway with one lane in each direction. (A highway that has an occasional passing lane is still considered as having one lane in each direction.) All riders must wear a seatbelt.	Trails, sidewalks, parks (other than parking lot), freeway, highways with more than one lane each direction. Any other area lawfully posted restricting such traffic.
	Go-Carts, Pocket Bikes, homemade vehicles with electric or internal combustion motors	Varies; too many variations to describe.	N/A	No public parks, sidewalks, roadways, or rights of way in North Salt Lake. May be eligible to be registered as an OHV for off-road use in other areas; check with Department of Motor Vehicles.	There are NO legal public areas, roadways, trails, parks, etc. for these types of vehicles. They are subject to impound if on public rights of way.
