MAYOR'S STATE OF THE CITY



As we begin 2018, I am pleased to report to you once again that the City is in good condition. Our General, Public Utility and other

funds are sound and we currently have a reasonable rainy day reserve. In past years, our city has experienced times of rapid population growth. As we approach build-out, we anticipate this growth will slow. We estimate our 2017 population at approximately 21,700 and we project we will add a few hundred residents each year for the next several years.

In 2017, we adopted a General Fund budget of \$11,084,500. We've maintained the City's "rainy day" fund at 25% of the General Fund which is the maximum allowed by State Law. The City also paid off the 25-year bond

quire increased investment. We have 59 miles of roadway, 86 miles of culinary water lines, 16 miles of secondary water lines and 42 miles of storm drain lines in North Salt Lake. Although built for varying degrees of useful life, many of these are over 30 years old. Our goal is to maximize use through proper maintenance and repair. We have recently contracted with Utah State University to perform a road condition survey of our streets and provide a comprehensive report, together with a priority and ranking system which will assist us in prioritizing road maintenance funds in the future. We continue to re-invest in roads, water lines and other utilities to keep our services useable, safe and efficient.

Retail growth continues on the west side of the City. Over the last year, we welcomed Lee's Marketplace and several other new stores and restaurants which have opened or will be opening soon, including: Burger King, Little Caesars Pizza, Holiday Oil, Del Taco, Empire Chinese, Ace Hardware, and AutoZone. In addition, ground was broken on another 5-tenant retail building in the project and we hope that the new businesses and

issued for the purchase of Eaglewood Golf Course, and we continue to reduce debt incurred for water projects and parks.

Most City assets are in good repair, although as these assets age, repairs to roads and other infrastructure will re-



services will meet many of our residents' needs. The project also includes an expansion of Spectrum Academy charter school.

STATE OF THE CITY (CONTINUED)

Construction will begin later this month reconstructing the I-215 interchange at Redwood Road. To improve this longstanding traffic bottleneck, the city co-funded a traffic study with UDOT resulting in this new project that includes the re-construction of the Center Street/Redwood Road intersection,



the widening of Redwood Road between Center Street and I-215 and the addition of new on and off-ramps to the freeway. This should make access on and off I-215 quicker and easier in the future. (See back for info.)

In 2017, we made some changes to our spring and fall clean up days. Rather than asking residents to load the bins and separate green and regular waste, we moved the drop off to our Public Works building at 642 North 400 West. This change allowed residents to have assistance unloading their waste and prevented contamination of waste streams, overloaded bins and garbage



strewn about the bin locations, saving the City a significant amount of labor and disposal costs. We hope you will take advantage of this service with our next spring clean-up May 4-6. Our Public Works crews will cheerfully assist you in unloading heavy items and you will be in and out quickly.

In 2017 the City competed for and received grants to help pay for a canoe takeout on the Jordan River, named Porter's Landing. This small park,



south of Center Street, is the final boat take-out ramp before the river flows into the Legacy Nature Preserve and the Great Salt Lake wetland systems. Porter's Landing was used extensively last summer and fall, and we hope it continues to provide enjoyment of this beautiful section of the Jordan River.

The South Davis Sewer District broke ground in 2017 on an exciting new facility called the Wasatch Resource Recovery plant. This facility will accept organic waste material (liquid and solid) and process it into natural gas, diverting thousands of tons of organic waste from landfills and converting it into enough natural gas to power a city of 40,000 residents. In addition, the district will invest in an algae recovery project. This project will use algae to further treat waste water and will eventually allow for the recovery of

about four million gallons of very clean re-use water for our city every day. It is anticipated that the revenues from gas



and algae sales will completely cover the costs of the projects, making this a great environmental plan that makes sense.

Our city continues to grow and evolve. We are blessed not only with great access to the vibrant business climate of the Salt Lake valley, but also the wonderful scenic and recreational opportunities of right outside our doors. We will inevitably face challenges, but our future is bright. Thanks to the City's capable employees, citizen volunteers of many kinds, and our great residents. I speak for the entire City Council in thanking you for the opportunity to serve you.



CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Beginning February 22, the Utah Department of Transportation will begin a major project to improve I-215 and Redwood Road in NSL by building a Diverging Diamond Interchange (DDI). See diagram at right for a brief summary of what is planned.


This is estimated to be a nine-month project, but will greatly improve this area as our city continues to grow.
