The City has had briefings from State and Federal partners that have been very informative. The Federal response to the Coronavirus is no longer containment, but mitigation. What that means in a practical way is that they are attempting to do everything possible to SLOW the spread of COVID-19. Slowing the spread of this virus will add time to all of our collective efforts and also allows for a more measured approach from our first responders and medical communities. A slower spread of the virus should also help avoid medical teams being overwhelmed or possibly infected and taken out of service. It is very important for all of us to do our part to limit and slow the spread of all



illness. We urge you to become familiar with recommended hygiene procedures and then calmly implement whatever changes you need in order to protect yourself and those around you.

As you know, the national Centers for Disease Control, the State of Utah and the Davis County Health Department have shared great resources with local government to help educate our communities. Today, the state officially classifies spurge as a noxious weed. It is an invasive species that can disrupt the natural ecosystem and can pose a threat to grass and other plants.


WHO TAKES CARE OF WHAT?
