PLEASE WEAR FACE COVERINGS

The City of North Salt Lake reminds all of us that the best way to reduce the spread of Coronavirus is to follow the recent directives of the Governor. Those directives were re-issued on July 10 when the Governor pleaded with the public to wear face coverings any time that it is not possible to socially distance. As a reminder, social distancing is maintaining a minimum of six (6) feet away from another person so that person-to-person spread is minimized. The City also encourages frequent hand washing, sanitizing of hands and infected surfaces and not touching one's face. These simple steps, when followed, will help all of us to stay free from illness, especially our more vulnerable populations. It is critically important to protect those over 65 or those who have underlying health problems since they are more at risk of serious illness or death from COVID-19. The City also strongly encourages its businesses to require masks indoors as a way to protect the public and employees.

NSL HAS HIGH RATE FOR DAVIS COUNTY

The City recently learned from the Davis County Health Department that unless the rapid rate of infection slows, they will soon be unable to perform effective tracing of contacts with individuals who are infected or properly follow-up with those that come into contact with those infected persons. The Health Department also expressed concern that large family gatherings can be a source of spread even if everyone at a gathering knows one another. It

is also important for young people who rightfully enjoy gathering in the summer months, to take precautions to reduce virus spread within their demographic. We recently had a gathering of an estimated 150-200 high school aged youth on July 3 at Eaglewood Golf Course all without masks and not socially distancing. The City of North Salt Lake has the highest rate of spread and growth in Davis County and that has occurred, in part, because when we gather in large groups, masks are not being worn and social distancing is not being observed. County officials were very clear that in our hospital system, we are near capacity in the number of ICU beds, rooms and personnel to adequately staff the Coronavirus response. No one wants the spread of the virus to outpace our capacity to respond with proper hospital treatment when that is needed.

Use of face coverings is a simple and effective way to reduce virus spread through our community. We know that some in our community feel that wearing a mask is a violation of personal freedom or believe that wearing face covering is not a scientifically proven or effective way

to protect against virus spread. For the health professionals who are charged with protecting the general health of the public, wearing face coverings when needed is a matter of public health and not a violation of personal rights. Even if you have a different opinion, we encourage you to wear a face covering for the common good.

As our rates of spread and infection arise, all of us want to avoid a change in the State's Phased Guidelines. Davis County is currently at a Yellow Phased Guideline and the Governor was very clear in his press conference on July 10 that if we cannot reduce the rate of infection in the State by August 1, stronger mandates may be used, including mandating face coverings Statewide and the possibility of a return to a stricter Phased Guideline for areas that may require it.

So, please try a little harder to socially distance, even among family and friends, maintain clean personal hygiene and follow the Governor's, Davis County's and the City's requests to please wear a face covering indoors and in situations where you can't socially distance.


BLUEPRINT JORDAN RIVER

CONSTRUCTION

CENTENNIAL WAY

The City will be hiring a contractor to replace the existing water line on Centennial Way from Raygene Way to Gary Way beginning in early August. A new water line on Freedom Circle will also be a part of this project. Residents in this area will be notified prior to construction as water will be shut off for a short period of time. Driveway access may also be briefly interrupted. Please obey all traffic signs and be extra cautious when commuting during construction.



MAIN STREET AT (150 N. TO 300 N.) INTERSECTIONS

Dates are still to be determined, but the City will be upsizing and replacing waterlines and replacing valves along Main Street at the intersections of 150 N., 200 N., 250 N., and 300 N. Road closures and detours will be announced as soon as the information is available. This work will be done in preparation for new asphalt to be installed along Main Street next year.
