WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR RECYCLABLES?



1. COLLECTION

Ace Recycling and Disposal collects full recycling containers from NSL residents on the designated recycling days for each neighborhood.



2. DROP OFF

Ace drops off recyclables at the Wasatch Integrated Waste Management (WIWM) facility in Layton. Waste is then processed in a highly mechanized system at their Material Recovery and Transfer Facility (see below), which sorts and processes recyclable materials for sale to market.



3. REUSE

WIWM will sell the bales to both national and international recyclers who turn the recyclables into new products.

Note: The market for recyclables is soft right now, so the quality of the material must be good. (See graphic on previous page for more information.)

WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR GARBAGE?

DID YOU KNOW...


Your REGULAR garbage goes through the same steps as above?

WIWM also processes our regular waste through this Material Recovery and Transfer Facility (see right). Household waste goes through a slightly different process, but this highly sophisticated, mechanized system is able to sort and pull recyclables from regular garbage.

But don't get rid of your recycling can just yet! The recyclable material pulled from the regular garbage is not as clean, so there is less of a market for its reuse. Cardboard, for example, is too wet when mixed with regular garbage.

Although this material is not as clean, this waste is used as "engineered fuel" that WIWM provides to a local cement plant.

So, continue to use your recycling can for best recycling results, but isn't it good to know that some of our other waste is being recycled as well?

UTAH'S QUALITY GROWTH STRATEGY

In 2000, a group of Utah Leaders created a Quality Growth Strategy to help guide Utah for the next 20 years to 2020. This group was part of the Envision Utah team. Here are some interesting notes about Utah following their strategy from then to today.

Utah was projected to grow by 1 million new residents. Utah had 1.6 million people in 1998 and today we have over 2.6 million. While that growth increase is pretty large, some interesting things have happened. Utah has added over 300,000 additional housing units of which single family homes comprise 67% today versus 71% in 1998. Apartments comprised 25% of the total then, and they do the same in 2020. 140 square miles have been saved as agricultural space, saving over \$4.5 billion in infrastructure for roads, sewers, water and stormwater pipelines in the process. 260 square miles were projected to be developed, but only 126 square miles were developed for growth in Utah. In other words that is a 52%

reduction in projected developed land growth.

Utah residents used 319 gallons of water per person per day in 1998. It was projected that we would be using 298 gallons per person in 2020. We are actually only using 225 gallons



per person in 2020, or 30% less today even with an additional 1 million more residents in our state. They attribute this to education, water metering, a smaller quantity of land developed per person, and less area to be watered per person. That is a 30% reduction in water use per person per day over the last 20 years.

In 1998 over 2,000 tons of air polluting emissions were produced per day along the Wasatch Front. In 2020 it was projected that we would emit 2,634 tons per day, but in fact we now emit only 964 tons per day, a 64% reduction. Utah has now also reached full compliance with the EPA standards for air pollution for the first time.

The Quality Growth Strategy goes on into the future. Envision Utah worked with the State Legislature to instigate tax incentives for the gas refineries in Utah to start producing Tier 3 gas. This gas eliminates 70% of the sulfur from the current fuel we use and will lower pollutants in the air by 70% in the future as more and more vehicles use it. New building codes being put in place will lower air emissions from buildings by 30% as well.
